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Alumna Spotlight

Mount Holyoke Alums shine on the red carpet in Venice... virtually and in person!

The 2020 Venice Film Festival, the first major film festival post-Covid to take place completely "live" this year, saw the triumph of "Nomadland", a film directed by Mount Holyoke alumna Chloé Zhao '05. (see insert below).

While Chloé could not attend the festival and receive her prize in person, another MHC alumna, Laura Aimone '04, was very much present on (and behind!) the Venetian red carpet, using her professional talents and expertise to ensure the success of the event.

Laura, a talent handler, festival organizer, and film director, has been working in the film industry for many years. Her intellectual curiosity and love for travel and adventure have brought her all over the world, but our alma mater still holds a special place in her heart.

Can you tell us a few words about yourself?

At a conference, I would introduce myself like this: my name is Laura Aimone, I was born and raised in Piemonte in the north-west of Italy, I chose to live in Venice, but I spend most of my time traveling the world; I've worked in the film industry for the past 15 years. If we were sipping a Nilgiri white tea from the Blue Mountains in an Indian teahouse, I would tell you: Namaste, my first ever friend was a foreigner, I've always been attracted to cultures other than mine and to listening to different stories; just like the main character of the first short film I wrote and directed last year is learning, I'm trying to live my life leaving the "what if" aside and just going for it. If we were in front of a canvas, I would use a mix of orange, red, pink and dark yellow, with dots of marine blue and green.

Did you have a vision of your career when you were at Mount Holyoke? How did that vision change over the years?

When I was at Mount Holyoke I still had not discovered what exactly I wanted to do when I would "grow up", but no matter what I would end up doing, it was imperative for me to do it with passion. One of my goals in life has always been to wake up and be happy to go to work, so I have tried to tailor made my job around my biggest passions. This has been the *leitmotiv* throughout my whole career with the result that, in most cases, the boundaries between doing it for pleasure or doing it for work are blurred. How lucky is that?

Was there a particular event or time that you recognised that being in the film industry would be your life and your living?

When I graduated in Foreign Languages and Literatures in 2002 I knew exactly which elements my dream job should have: international context, the possibility to travel and to be in touch with different cultures, a very strong connection with the arts, interesting and stimulating people around, organisational elements. I was just not sure this job existed! After some rambling around between international holiday resorts in Egypt and the Dominican Republic and a teaching fellowship at Mount Holyoke College, the teacher I had graduated with asked me if I was willing to give a hand to the Director of the Women's Film Festival in Torino, who was looking for someone who could speak English. I still remember the feeling on the first day of work: it was exactly like when you enter a house for the first time and you just know that's exactly where you want to live.

What's your favourite part of your job and why do you love working in the film industry?

Without any doubt, the chance to meet likeminded people from all over the world and to be surrounded by stimulating minds. This happens when I'm working as talent handler on red carpets, when I'm discussing the logistics of a Festival with agents/pr managers, when I'm interviewing a director during a Q&A session, when I'm on set shooting my own film and, more indirectly, when I'm selecting films for a Festival program or watching them as part of the Festival jury. No matter how long you've done it for, **it is a job that can always surprise, challenge and enrich you.** Dull moments are just not contemplated, the only downside is it's addictive!

NOMADLAND

Last September, at the **77th Venice Film Festival**, the first A-list festival to happen since lockdown, *Nomadland* by **MHC graduate Chloé Zhao** was awarded the Golden Lion for best film, shortly followed by the People's Choice Award at the Toronto Film Festival.

Zhao thus becomes only **the fifth female director** – after Sofia Coppola, Mira Nair, Agnès Varda and Margarethe von Trotta – to win Venice's top prize.

The film portrays the story of Fern, a strong-minded and free-spirited lady, who, following the economic collapse of a company town in rural Nevada, packs her van and sets off on the road exploring a life outside of conventional society as a modern-day nomad. Frances McDormand's performance is extraordinary and she fluidly melts in with the real nomads in the film that serve as mentors and comrades in her adventure through the vast landscape of the American West. It is a subtle exploration of loss and grief, but also a celebration of how much little details and trivial encounters can add colors to the shades of grey.

Ultimately, it is a hymn to a lady who seems to know herself very well and always looks ahead, even when the road is not pointing anywhere.

The film is scheduled to be theatrically released in the United States on December 4, 2020.

She is currently working on her third and building an online program to help women move abroad confidently and sustainably.

MHC European Alumnae Council Meeting

The annual meeting of the European Alumnae Council took place on 17 October via Zoom.

The 19 Council members present engaged in fruitful and animated discussions, which focused on evaluating the virtual activities and outreach since the highly successful European Alumnae Symposium in Athens and on drafting new plans and projects to support our European Alumnae network.

Eleanor Chang '78, Director at Large, Global Strategy at the Alumnae Association, joined the group for part of the meeting, bringing everyone up to speed with the latest developments at the Association.

During the meeting, Silvia Maulini '80 (Chair) and Virginia Ross '66 (Treasurer) were unanimously confirmed for a new four-year term. The Council also acknowledged the past contributions of Maya D'Costa, former MHEAC liaison officer at the Alumnae Association, who left the organization at the beginning of the year.

<u>Update on the next European Alumnae Symposium</u>

In view of the complexity of the current health situation, all members agreed to defer a decision about the date of the next European Alumnae Council until an extraordinary council meeting in January 2021.

Jane Robinson, Ladies Can't Climb Ladders: The Pioneering
Adventures of the First Professional Women

Jane Robinson, Ladies Can't Climb Ladders: The Pioneering Adventures of the First Professional Women

As a child Jane Robinson was banned from her local library for using a jam tart as a bookmark. Undeterred, Jane started her **own book collection**; **studied English as an undergraduate at Somerville College, Oxford**; **became an antiquarian bookseller**; and began writing about social history through women's eyes. This trajectory embodies the spirit of earlier women pioneers, and makes Jane the perfect author to launch the **first EAC Literary Apertif**, which was Zoomed to two dozen alumnae on August 29, 2020.

Jane's tale begins in the gas-lit dust of a March evening in 1920, as women arrive at the Palace of Westminster, London, for a dinner to celebrate the passage of the **Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act (1919).** This decree enabled women to join the professions, to receive degrees, and to sit on juries. The celebration was short-lived. Even with this historic legislation, **women had to battle to overcome** the prevailing attitudes that a woman's place is in the home or that thinking too much shrinks a woman's womb.

Jane introduces us to women who took advantage of the act to become a lawyer, a medic, an architect, an academic, an engineer, and to enter the clergy. One pioneer, Ida Mann, rejected a career in the Post Office Savings Bank and daringly studied at the London School of Medicine. Ida made her own uniform, a jacket with multi-pockets for medical equipment, a sturdy skirt, and "had her own skeleton, probably dug from the battlefields of the Napoleonic Wars." Stockings of emerald green, purple, or scarlet completed her outfit.

These pioneers, entering fields newly opened to women, were pestered and mocked, but stood up against an entrenched patriarchal culture, each in her own unique way. As a fellow alum remarked, "these are nice stories with a wow factor. There is a warmth about these women, who feel like a friend along the road", but they also persevered and pioneered, forging into their respective, professional fields.

Following Jane's talk there were Q&As from alumnae, followed by our enthusiastic thanks. A literary aperitif toast to Jane for revealing the engaging stories of these women pioneers!

Germany

The German alumnae community remained connected over the summer by holding regional events in the open air and in small groups.

In July Marcia Schenck '09, Regional Head of the Berlin group, got together with three alums for a walk in the beautiful **park of Schloss Sanssouci in Potsdam**.

Meanwhile, the Munich group headed by Nancy Kuehler '65 was keeping in touch via different online channels. Most recently the The Düsseldorf - Cologne Regional Group met for a **guided tour of the** *Skulpturenpark* **in Cologne.** Holding this event was possible due to the joint effort of the Regional Group Head, Vanieta Canonico-Jahn '77, and the special Cologne Liaison of the Group, Imke Kahlenberg 'MHCG.

In Memoriam Ilse Peschek Lerche `51

The Mount Holyoke European Alumnae Community mourns the passing of Ilse Peschek Lerche `51, who died in her home on September 14, 2020, at the age of 91.

Ilse was the first German student to attend MHC after World War II, and her year on (and off) campus was a life-changing experience. After the massive destruction and many deprivations she had experienced in Germany during and after the war, she delighted in the lighthearted jauntiness of her classmates, the serene beauty of the campus and the wonder of having chicken three times a week. Throughout her life, Ilse maintained strong ties to the MHC alumnae in Munich and was a very active and important member of the planning committee for the European Alumnae Symposium in Munich in 2000.

By chance, Ilse, a Chemistry student whose institute had been bombed, discovered a sign for a scholarship to the USA posted on a door at her university shortly before the 1pm deadline for oral interviews. After knocking on the door spontaneously, this student of natural sciences impressed the American interviewer with her realistic views and desire for new academic experiences and was accepted.

With a refugee passport and a scholarship thanks to her excellent grades, Ilse set forth on her great adventure on an overnight train ride to Cannes, France, and then a ship under Panamanian flag to NYC via Lisbon, Portugal, the first city on her way that hadn't been bombed. Imagine her surprise to be housed in a dorm near a lake in a double room as big as her family's apartment for four. To Ilse's amazement, Gracious Living, elegant dining in the dorm once a week with the students as hostesses to professors, meant dressing in evening gowns with petticoats. With the help of classmates, this problem, too, was surmounted. In her eyes, all her classmates seemed to come from wealthy families while she was the poor little thankful church mouse who knitted old sweaters into new ones. Ilse's roommate, Jean Redding, became a wonderful bridge to American life, once taking her along on a blind date to West Point, and, after graduation, Ilse became her bridesmaid, wearing a dress given to her by Jean's parents. Another classmate invited her to the opera in NYC, her first time ever due to the massive bombardment of Germany.

Equipped with a solid basis in Chemistry and a love for America that had begun with American CARE packages and school lunches, Ilse, who had already been taking university courses in Germany, easily became a top student in sciences at MHC. What a surprise it was to learn about an academic honor code, an anathema to German students who grow up with a "code of friendship" and "honor" helping one another during tests. At MHC, the honor code became stamped on Ilse's soul. At the end of the academic year, Ilse's classmates voted this one-year student to be a member of the Class of '51, so she was able to take part in the Commencement celebration. She was offered a scholarship to continue her studies at Mount Holyoke, but could only think of her family in their one-room apartment and how her fatherland needed her help in rebuilding every facet of the country while she was enjoying beautiful experiences. She decided to turn down the offer and think no more of her own advantage.

After graduation and the extension of her visa, Ilse set forth on a Greyhound bus trip throughout the USA from the beautiful Berkshires and Rockefeller Center to San Francisco, enjoying the hospitality of one alumna family after the other and thankful for help from the Methodist Church. Again and again, her hosts tried to understand nights spent in bomb shelters and life in a destroyed Germany after the war. During storms, she still woke up thinking of soldiers at the front moving nearer. Ilse felt humbled to be able to exchange stories of the "old country" with a lovely old Jewish couple for whom she was a welcome connection to the past, someone with whom they could speak German and rejoice in old memories of times before the war. She met with friendship and acceptance everywhere.

During her academic year at MHC, she had even fallen in love with a French student at Amherst College, but then she returned to Germany and continued her studies of Chemistry and Biology to get a doctorate. There she met and married Peter Lerche (deceased 2016), who became one of Germany's foremost constitutional lawyers with a chair for constitutional law at the Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich. Ilse and Peter enjoyed 61 years of marriage and had two sons, Wolfgang, a nuclear physicist at CERN, and Clemens, then a legal adviser to the Bavarian State government. For the European Alumnae Symposium in 2000, Clemens kindly arranged a diplomatic reception at the seat of the government in Munich.

Ilse was an extraordinary person and carried memories of Mount Holyoke College in her heart. We miss her.
